British Museum Technical Research Bulletin. Online only, published once a year by [Archetype Publications for the British Museum](#).

The Bulletin examines a broad range of objects and materials from across the British Museum's collections and publishes the results of the collaborative work of curators, conservators and scientists. Each issue aims to encompass objects from different continents, historical periods and material types, and is designed to appeal to those with a general interest in the museum's collections, as well as specialists who wish to broaden their knowledge. Volume 1 is now available in full text with color images, free on the web site. Summaries of the PDF articles are available in English, Chinese, French, German, Italian, and Japanese. A sample article is "New visions of a new world: the conservation and analysis of the John White watercolours," which describes the examination, analysis, and treatment of the drawings prior to an exhibition at the museum in 2007. The articles are accessible and very easy to understand—not overly technical—however, I wouldn't expect to see this publication listed in the collection of a small public library. It's not completely academic, in that you don't need a Ph.D. to understand the content, but the descriptions of the conservation treatments and investigative techniques really do target a niche market. The European Journal of Education Studies is a refereed journal with an editorial board based in Turkey, Romania, Egypt, Puerto Rico, and the United States, which "aims to provide a forum for original investigations and theoretical studies in education." The journal covers the social sciences for the most part, although the editorial board encourages contributions from a wider field of study, covering "applied and theoretical approaches to the study of education and its closely related disciplines."
